Message from Mr Crane Head of School



Mental Health First Aid

We are very happy to announce that two members of The Colne staff, Alison Green and Fi Wynne, both completed their Mental Health First Aid training at The Sigma Trust Education Centre. The course was an intensive two day workshop, providing the tools to support individuals with their mental health. Alison and Fi now have an abundance of contacts and agencies to help signpost individuals to specific support where required. They both said the course was fantastic and would highly recommend it to any individual who gets the opportunity to take part.

Our Year 10 and Year 11 students have had the opportunity to take part in some extra activities to help maintain and improve their wellbeing. We have had Tom Ryder from [Retune](#), to deliver a workshop to each year group. Through live performance, open discussion and pupil participation, Retune’s wellbeing workshops demonstrate the importance of using creative outlets such as music, art, drama, dance and writing to maintain wellbeing and build emotional resilience.

Hi, I’m Tom. I’m a musician and journalist, and I have a diagnosis of bipolar disorder.

When I was hospitalised for poor mental health in my late teens and early twenties, I noticed that patients were using creative outlets such as writing, drawing, painting, singing, dancing and cooking as coping mechanisms.

I founded Retune because I believe there is a very strong link between creativity and mental wellbeing that deserves to be explored further.

As with fine-tuning a musical instrument or altering the frequency on a radio, ‘retuning’ your mental health involves small adjustments. We can all improve our wellbeing by finding creative outlets and being part of a supportive community.

Attendance Facts

The only **legally accepted reasons** for not being in school are illness, holiday approved by the school or a day of religious observance

80% attendance is the same as having a day off every week

The school will not authorise absences without a **good reason** for the child being off

If you take your child out of school during term time you could be issued with a **Fixed Penalty Notice Fine**

It is the school and **not** the parents who decide whether to authorise absences. The parent's note is necessary because the reasons given need to be considered by the school

Reporting your child ill without a reason will not be authorised

Medical evidence is required after 10 sessions (5 days) of illness unless your child has a genuine medical condition that the school is aware of

Less than 90% attendance is classed as 'persistent absence' and could lead to your child being fast tracked. This could result in a **fine which could lead to prosecution**

Parents are **expected** to contact the school **daily** before **9.00am** if their child is absent.

Children with poor attendance often become the victims of bullying as friendship groups become established and they fall behind with their work

If your child's attendance falls below **97%** your child may be spoken to by a member of the Attendance Team to see if anything can be done to help stop their attendance falling any lower.

Important Covid-19 Information

If your child displays Covid symptoms and you have a PCR test done please inform the school immediately.

Once you receive the PCR result this needs to be forwarded to the Attendance Officer as soon as possible. It can be emailed to mail@colne.school

If a member of your household is able to self-isolate efficiently after testing positive your child can still come to school as long as they remain symptom free and take daily LFT tests for 7 days.

All students are issued with boxes of LFTs to test at home. We recommend that they test on Sundays and Wednesdays each week.

The school does hold some spare LFT kits if they are required. Mrs. S. Wallace is the school's point of contact for these and all Covid related issues.



Being Late

Take a look and see how being late each day impacts on learning. For the child who is always late this can have a dramatic impact on their education.

Turning up late to lessons does not only have an impact on the child who is late but also disrupts the learning of the rest of the class when they arrive and subsequently the teacher having to repeat instructions rather than being able to move on with the lesson as planned.

Please be considerate of your teachers and classmates by being on time and not disturbing everyone's learning.



Not Attending School

It is vitally important that students do attend school when they are supposed to.


We know that sometimes you can be really too poorly or have another reason to be off that has been agreed by the school. If you feel a bit off colour but are generally ok then you are expected to attend school.

Although attendance is as important in Years 7, 8 and 9 as it is in Years 10 and 11, many think it is ok to skip lessons or even days. But the early years are just as important for building the foundations of the knowledge all students will require to pass their GCSEs. Without the foundations or with holes in it then study in Years 10 and 11 will be all the more difficult.

When our students leave our care we want them to get the most out of the great education that is on offer to them and achieve what they so richly deserve. We want them to be set for life in the adult world of college, university and work where the consequences can be harsh for consistent lateness and days off.


We now look forward to continuing our match play in the Colchester Youth League, where we can test our skills and gain experience playing against local netball clubs.



Year 11 Taster Day

On Wednesday 10th November, Year 11 students were lucky enough to experience a college taster day at Sigma Sixth. The day allowed students to get a taste of a variety of subjects which they could study at college next year. Each student was lucky enough to trial out three different sessions and get fully stuck into the content. The sessions delivered gave each student a full insight to the type of content they would receive at colleges and the types of activities they would be completing if selecting that course. The day was a great success with students getting a feel for a normal college day and the independence which comes with going to college.

In the Autumn Term our Year 9 students received a workshop called "Elite Skills Academy" from the British Army. This workshop focused on problem solving and team building tasks. The students also received a careers presentation about the different opportunities available in the British Army.

Students had to use limited equipment to rescue supplies from a minefield scenario. All students needed to cross and take all materials and supplies with them. The difficult part of this scenario was they did not have enough planks that were long enough to form one continuous bridge of safety.



In the final scenario the team was broken into two smaller teams and they had to pass heavy supplies over a ravine. This task was difficult due to the length of the ravine.

The students learnt many new things and were shown that working as a team can achieve things that otherwise seem impossible. Everyone had a great time and thoroughly enjoyed the experience.



The KS3 STEM club also launched this half term. As part of the KS3 STEM club launch students are completing a range of activities that will develop their applied mathematics skills, exploration and teambuilding. The students will be creating a short film on an environmentally friendly project of their choice as part of a competition across the Sigma Trust.

The Year 10 STEM club also launched this half term. The students will be working towards their Bronze Crest awards on an environmentally friendly project of their choice. The students will design and make a product that will solve a current world problem such as global warming or plastic pollution in the oceans.

Three SIN-Full Recipes for Christmas

Christmas truffles

Ingredients

150g dark chocolate, chopped
150g milk chocolate, chopped
150ml double cream
50g unsalted butter
cocoa powder, sprinkles, lustre powder, icing sugar, chopped nuts, for coating
flavourless oil (such as sunflower), for shaping



Method

STEP 1

Put the dark and milk chocolate in a bowl, then put the cream and butter in a pan and bring to a simmer. Pour the hot cream over the chocolate and stir until it melts. Leave to cool, then chill in the fridge for 7 hrs.

STEP 2

Put the coatings into separate bowls. To shape the truffles, lightly rub your hands with flavourless oil and roll teaspoons of the truffle mix between your palms – this can get messy!

STEP 3

Gently roll the truffles in the bowl until evenly coated, then put in a box and chill. Store in the fridge in an airtight container for three days or freeze for up to a month. Defrost in the fridge overnight

Vegan Tiffin

Ingredients

75g coconut oil, plus extra for the tin
200g vegan dark chocolate (at least 70%), roughly chopped
2 tbsp golden syrup
200g vegan ginger nuts
100g dried cranberries
50g pistachios, toasted and chopped



Method

STEP 1

Lightly oil a 20cm square brownie tin with coconut oil and line the base with baking parchment. Melt the chocolate with the coconut oil and golden syrup in the microwave in 30 second bursts until smooth and glossy.

STEP 2

Break the ginger nuts into small pieces in a bowl, then add the dried cranberries and pistachios. Scrape in the chocolate mixture and give everything a good mix to combine, then spoon the tiffin into the tin. Use the back of the spoon to smooth out the top and press it down, then chill in the fridge for 2hrs or until set hard. Once set, cut into 25 mini squares. Will keep for a week in the fridge.

Espresso & Dark chocolate Biscotti

Ingredients

300g plain flour
100g caster sugar
50g light brown soft sugar
1½ tsp baking powder
80g vegetable oil
1 large egg
2 tsp vanilla extract
250g dark chocolate chips
2½ tbsp instant coffee granules, dissolved in 3 tbsp hot water and cooled



Method

STEP 1

Heat the oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4, and line a baking tray with baking parchment. Set aside. Put the flour, sugars, baking powder and a good pinch of salt into a large bowl, then stir to combine.

STEP 2

Whisk the oil, egg, vanilla extract and coffee together in a separate small bowl. Slowly pour the wet ingredients into the dry, mixing until you have a dry dough. Fold in 100g of the chocolate chips. Knead the dough until smooth – it will be quite dry, but if it's too difficult to knead, add another 1 tbsp water. Divide the dough in half, shaping each piece into a 25 x 8cm log, and transfer both to the prepared tray. Bake for 25-30 mins, then leave to cool on the tray for 15 mins.

STEP 3

Reduce the oven to 160C/140C fan/gas 3. Slice the biscotti logs into 1-2cm-thick slices crosswise using a sharp knife, you should have about 16. Return to the tray and bake for 15-20 mins more, turning the tray around halfway through. Leave to cool slightly on the tray, then transfer to a wire rack and leave to cool completely.
